## Taking Stock and Clarifying Values

As you review hog production systems, be sure to give your family's values, interests and resources serious consideration. The system you decide to use may significantly affect the amount of time you spend together, family members' roles on the farm, your family income and your children's interest in and ability to take over the farm and hog operation when you retire.

You should also review any impact your decision may have on your relationship with your community and neighbors. In several communities, concerns about odor and water quality have generated considerable conflict between livestock producers and their neighbors. Increasingly restrictive local ordinances and growing numbers of non-farm rural residents may also limit your options. Taking potential community concerns into consideration helps you maintain good relations with your neighbors and avoid local efforts to restrict the implementation of your plans.

The questions here are designed to stimulate your family's thinking about your potential hog enterprise. They can help you assess your family and farm's resources and strengths, identify your interests and values and set priorities. Use your answers in considering the hog production system options addressed in this book.
